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NH RESIDENTS POSITIVE ABOUT SUNUNU, LEGISLATURE, STATE OUTLOOK

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DURHAM, NH – Newly-elected Governor Chris Sununu's job approval is consistent with those of his predecessors at the outset of their governorships, and his personal favorability has risen considerably since the 2016 campaign. Granite Staters are increasingly positive about the State Legislature's performance and the overall direction of the state.

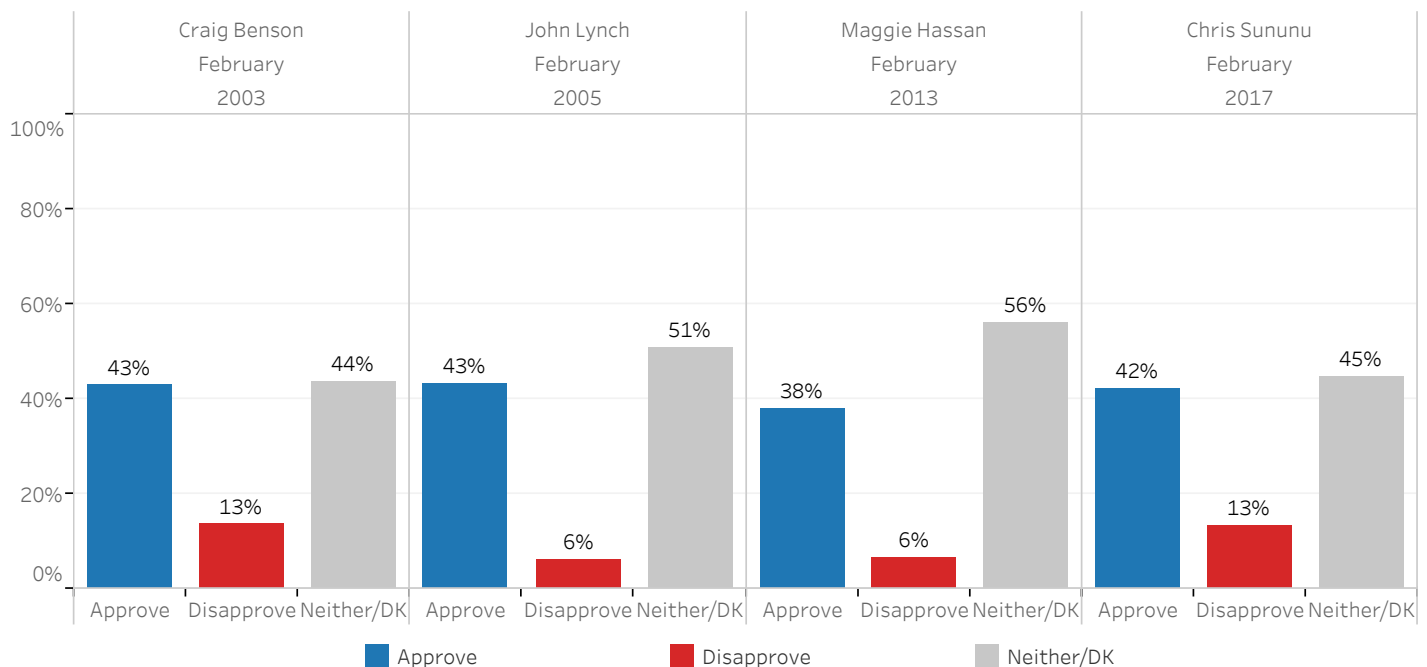
These findings are based on the latest **Granite State Poll***, conducted by the University of New Hampshire Survey Center. Five hundred and five (505) randomly selected New Hampshire adults were interviewed by landline and cellular telephone between January 31 and February 8, 2017. The margin of sampling error for the survey is +/- 4.4 percent.

Gubernatorial Approval

Chris Sununu was sworn in as New Hampshire's 82nd governor on January 5, 2017. He begins his term with similar approval ratings as his three most recent predecessors, Craig Benson, John Lynch, and Maggie Hassan. In the most recent Granite State Poll, 42% of Granite Staters say they approve of the job Sununu is doing as governor, 13% disapprove, and 45% are neutral or don't know enough to say. In February 2003, 43% of New Hampshire adults said they approved of the job Craig Benson was doing as Governor, in February 2005, 43% approved of John Lynch, and in February 2013, 38% approved of Maggie Hassan.

Republicans (58%), those who frequently listen to conservative radio (57%) and those who frequently watch WMUR (52%) are most likely to say they approve of the job Sununu is doing as governor. Democrats (28%) and those who have completed postgraduate work (31%) are least likely to approve of Sununu.

NH Gubernatorial Approval at 1 Month into Term

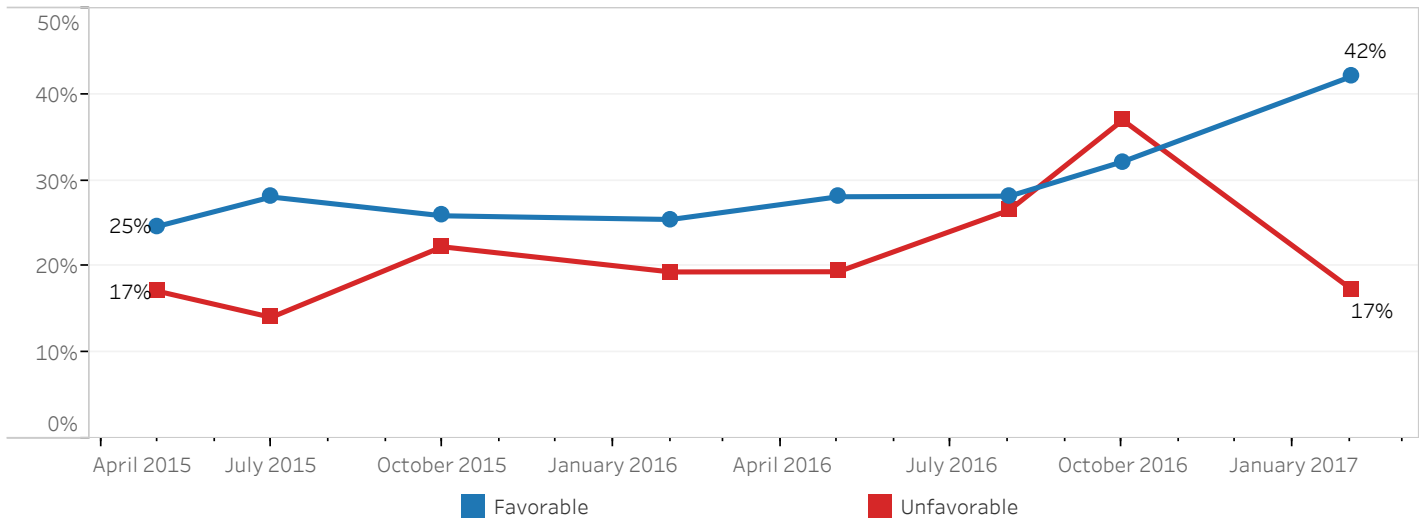

Favorability Ratings - Governor Chris Sununu

Sununu's personal favorability ratings have increased since his election in November 2016. Currently, 42% of New Hampshire adults say they have a favorable opinion of Sununu, 17% have an unfavorable opinion, 19% are neutral, and 22% say they don't know enough about him to say. Sununu's net favorability rating, the percentage having a favorable opinion minus the percentage having an unfavorable opinion, is +25%, up significantly from -5% in October 2016. Sununu is very popular among Republicans (+50% net favorable) and popular among Independents (+31%), but somewhat unpopular among Democrats (-9%).

Favorability Ratings - NH Governor Chris Sununu

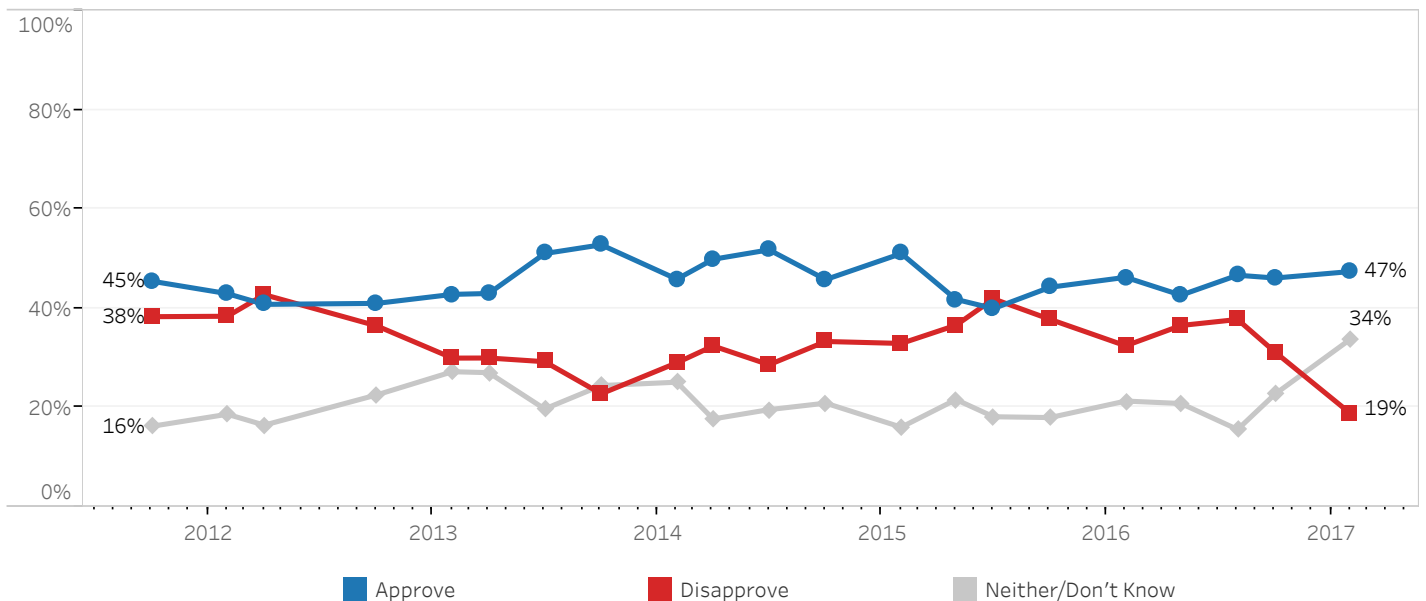


Approval of New Hampshire Legislature

Republicans retained control of both houses of the New Hampshire legislature in the November 2016 election. This represents the first time since 2010 that one party has held both houses of the legislature and the Governor's office. Currently, 47% of New Hampshire adults approve of how the State Legislature is doing its job, 19% disapprove, and 34% are neutral or don't know enough to say. Approval of the State Legislature has largely remained steady recently, but only half as many New Hampshire adults disapprove of the job they are doing compared to August 2016, when 38% disapproved.

Approval is somewhat tied to partisanship: a majority (58%) of Republicans approve of the job the legislature is doing but only 44% of Independents and 38% of Democrats feel that way.

Approval Rating - NH Legislature

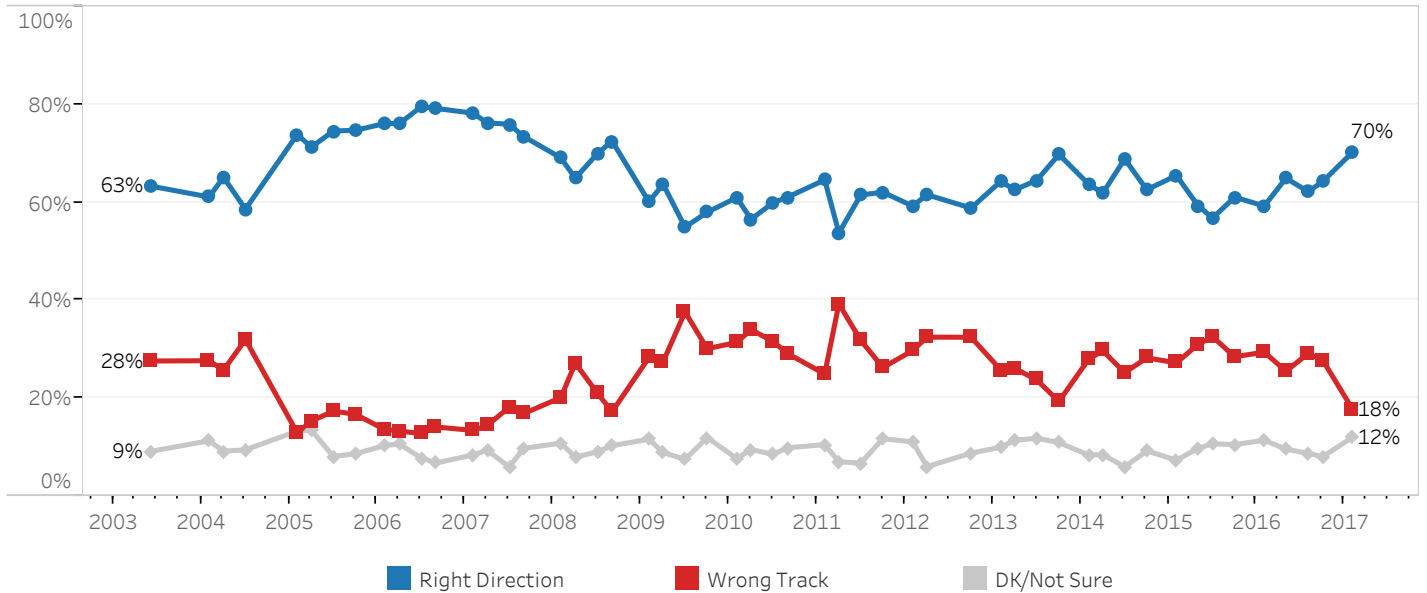


Right Direction or Wrong Track

Most New Hampshire residents continue to think the state as a whole is headed in the right direction. Currently, 70% of New Hampshire adults feel the state is heading in the right direction, only 18% think the state is seriously off on the wrong track, and 12% don't know or are unsure. The percentage of Granite Staters who think the state is on the right track (70%) is tied for the highest amount since September 2008. This feeling is bipartisan as majorities of Republicans (77%), Democrats (71%), and Independents (60%) say the state is headed in the right direction.

Respondents who frequently read the Union Leader (85%) and those with a high school degree or less (82%) are most likely to say NH is heading in the right direction.

Granite State Poll Methodology

These findings are based on the latest Granite State Poll, conducted by the University of New Hampshire Survey Center. Five hundred and five (505) randomly selected New Hampshire adults were interviewed in English by landline and cellular telephone between January 31 and February 8, 2017. The margin of sampling error for the survey is +/- 4.4 percent. These MSE's have not been adjusted for design effect. The design effect for the survey is 1.2%.

The random sample used in the Granite State Poll was purchased from Marketing Systems Group (MSG), Horsham, PA. MSG screens each selected telephone number to eliminate non-working numbers, disconnected numbers, and business numbers to improve the efficiency of the sample, reducing the amount of time interviewers spend calling non-usable numbers.

The data have been weighted to adjust for numbers of adults and telephone lines within households. Additionally, data were weighted by respondent sex, age, education, and region of the state to targets from the most recent American Community Survey (ACS) conducted by the U.S. Census Bureau. In addition to potential sampling error, all surveys have other potential sources of non-sampling error including question order effects, question wording effects, and non-response. Due to rounding, percentages may not sum to 100%. The number of respondents in each demographic below may not equal the number reported in cross-tabulation tables as some respondents choose not to answer some questions.
