The mission of the Cooperative Middle School is to provide a challenging, safe and healthy learning environment designed to meet the social, emotional and intellectual needs of all students.

The Cooperative Middle School currently has an enrollment of 1312 students in grades six through eight. Each grade level is made up of four teams and each team follows a House System. Students experience a robust curriculum at the middle school. In addition to the core subjects of math, sci-

ence, social studies, and language arts, students participate in unified arts classes such as: art, world lanquage, technology education, family and consumer science, leadership studies, health and physical education. Students also have the opportunity to participate in performing arts programs such as band, chorus, string orchestra and general music. After school there are a wide variety of activities/sports/clubs for students to join. CMS is a welcoming school community offering extraordinary learning opportunities both during and after school hours.

OUR LEARNING COMMUNITY

Exeter High School (EHS) serves approximately 1700 students from the SAU 16 towns of Exeter, Brentwood, East Kingston, Stratham, Kensington and Newfields. Situated only 14 miles from the University of New Hampshire, EHS and our supportive communities are rich in historical and academic tradition. We appreciate the wealth of resources afforded to us to provide for the academic, social, and civic development of our students.

COMPETENCY-BASED EDUCATION

Core competencies across content domains have been developed in all academic areas. Our faculty of almost 150 are collaborative and collegial, and meet regularly in PLCs to review student assessment and achievement as we continue to develop our competency-based education model and refine our practices. Course credit is currently awarded to students who demonstrate attainment of the course competencies as well as other course requirements. Students are also evaluated on the New Hampshire Work-Study practices of Communication, Creativity, Collaboration, and Self-Direction as a measure of college and career readiness. The concept of relearning is put into action at EHS through universal retake practices, as well as ample opportunities for credit recovery. EHS promotes lifelong learning for our students and faculty. Participation in the UNH Education Program is one way we model our commitment to continued growth for our students.

CURRICULUM

The program of studies at Exeter High School offers more than 150 courses within 12 disciplines. EHS has a comprehensive curriculum with a variety of academic levels of instruction that range from Advanced Placement to core academic offerings. EHS students may also elect to take courses at the Seacoast School of Technology, on-line, through extended learning opportunities (ELO), and dual enrollment with Southern New Hampshire University and Great Bay Community College (Running Start). Courses run full year and half year on a modified block schedule. Students can be enrolled in up to seven courses at one time. Interns are expected to assume professional responsibilities in delivering the curriculum and supporting student learning throughout the school.

Perception of Interns at Noble:

At Noble High School, we consider interns to be an integral part of the learning environment. Teachers and students highly value the internship process; students see themselves as another teacher in the classroom while teachers see interns as a member of the teaching team. Interns are encouraged to take part in every aspect of education: professional development, curriculum development, grading, classroom management, and supporting students with intensive RTI, all within a team-based setting. Noble enjoys being a member of the UNH Internship process having many former interns amongst our staff who enjoy taking interns and take the responsibility very seriously.

- All students are enrolled in an academy with interdisciplinary teams located in contiguous classrooms that provide a small-school atmosphere

PROFICIENCY- BASED TEACHING AND LEARNING

Noble has a proficiency-based (standards-

based) system of teaching and learning. This system of instruction, assessment, and academic reporting is based on students' demonstration of what they know and are able to do. Work habits and academic achievement are reported as separate grades.

- ◆ All core courses are aligned to NHS Graduation Standards; students must demonstrate proficiency to earn a diploma

DEMOGRAPHICS

WHS makes its **HOME** in Hampton, NH. It serves the communities of Hampton, Hampton Falls, Seabrook, and North Hampton. Boston, MA, Portland, ME, and Manchester, NH, are all within commuting distance.

PERSONALIZATION

Winnacunnet is not exceptional in spite of its diversity, it is exceptional because of its diversity. Academic expectations are delivered through a wide range of academic courses and electives to support 21st century learning expectations.

FRESHMAN SEMINAR is designed to prepare all students with the knowledge, skills, and attitudes to make a successful transition from middle school to high school. CAPSTONE EXPERIENCES provide the foundation for a successful transition to COLLEGE & CAREER.

Every student at WHS develops a **PERSONAL LEARNING PLAN** through the use of interest and ability explorers in order to inform academic, personal and professional **GOALS**.

Warrior Block, otherwise known as **ADVISORY**, offers an opportunity for every student at WHS to connect with an adult in the building other than their guidance counselor.

ACADEMIC EXCELLENCE

Upwards of a third of the student body at Winnacunnet Cooperative High School is enrolled in Advanced Placement and Honors level courses, grades 9-12. Students participating in the annual Advanced Placement (AP) exam outpaced both the National and State scores.

PROJECT BASED LEARNING opportunities such as the WHS Dory Project, Project Lead the Way and VEX Robotics increase student **ENGAGEMENT** in content areas.

255 seniors graduated in the class of 2016. Graduates were accepted into over 270 colleges and universities.

WHS **LITERACY** indicators, by grade, outpace the 75th percentile as measured by the Lexile reading inventory.

WHS provides a number of interventions for students struggling in core academic areas and other social and economic concerns.

CURRICULUM

Elective courses are offered in every academic department. Students can choose electives to complement their college and career goals and to apply core academic skills in real life settings. The elective courses also allow students opportunities to explore areas of interests.

WHS offers over 400 independent courses, including 155 **ELECTIVES** in 13 different departments.

DISTANCE LEARNING opportunities for WHS students are available online through the Virtual Learning Academy.


Curriculum options include **COLLEGE & CAREER** pathways through Running Start, the Seacoast School of Technology and the **WHS EVENING PROGRAM**.

Embedded Professional Development utilizes **TEACHERS AS COACHES** to share and improve teaching & learning at the classroom level.

COMMUNITY OUTREACH

Relevance, engagement, and whole community involvement are essential elements of the culture of WHS.

EXTENDED LEARNING OPPORTUNITIES (ELO) allow students to break free of the traditional school structure and participate in authentic learning through school and community contexts. These experiences include internships, real-world career explorations, advanced studies and project based learning.

In the **AMERICAN DREAM UNIT** students explore their interests as related to college and career options.

The annual **COLLEGE & CAREER FAIR** allows students to interact with local, regional and national employers.

WHS participates in numerous food drives and fundraising events for local charities, blood drives, and other positive community service activities.

Employment opportunities are posted on daily announcements and students with educational disabilities have access to a work experience/transition coordinator.

TECHNOLOGICAL INNOVATION

Winnacunnet distinguishes itself through innovation in both instructional tools and expertise. Winnacunnet's goal is to provide the best resources and tools available to every student, regardless of their economic background, physical location or area of curricular interest.

WHS will be a fully implemented 1:1 **GOOGLE APPS FOR EDUCATION** School by the 2018-2019 school year.

Winnacunnet student learning and technology initiatives have been featured at the Christa McAuliffe Technology Conference, the New England Secondary School Consortium and the New England Google Summit.

The 2014 implementation of Read & Write for Google was the subject of a Google Case Study on effective technology implementation.

STUDENT ACTIVITIES

Winnacunnet has a long and rich history of **CO-CURRICULAR ACTIVITIES** and award-winning teams. As a school community, over 44% of students participate in athletics.


