

From the Coordinator

A letter from Dr. Siobhan Senier



Many of us who are returning to UNH this fall are still feeling bruised by a painful spring 2017 semester. Open displays of white supremacy, sexual harassment, and acts of transphobia and homophobia roiled our campus, as indeed they have continued to roil the country all summer long. And yet, I can't help but feel cautious excitement as I look forward to reuniting with old friends and colleagues and meeting new ones. While our program, like many programs committed to social justice, continues to be targeted for harassment from several quarters, UNH Women's Studies is now also stronger than ever.

Thanks to extraordinary support from our Dean and Provost, we are welcoming not one, but *three* new full-time professors this year. Dr. Tina Beyene studies African feminist discourses around sexual violence and armed conflict; she'll be bringing her much-

needed expertise not only to Women's Studies, but also to Justice Studies and International Affairs. Dr. Aria Halliday writes about Black and Caribbean girls' uses of new media and digital space; expect to learn a lot from her about Twitter, Instagram, and memes! And Dr. Kabria Baumgartner, who arrives in January, will be teaching and researching antebellum African-American education for both Women's Studies and English. We are so excited to have this dynamic trio joining our ranks.

Thanks, too, to the steadfast, decade-long leadership of my predecessor, Dr. Marla Brettschneider, we have some additional funding through our <u>Social Justice Leadership Project</u>. Thus far we have been able to fund some student travel to conferences and to offer an additional course on Managing Social Justice Organizations. If you know Marla, you know it's impossible to list all of her contributions in a newsletter like this, but one other thing I'd like to note here is her shepherding of the new <u>Feminist Studies Graduate Certificate</u>. With great help from Dean Cari Moorhead in the Graduate School, that certificate is rolling out this year, and we're ready to engage new and current graduate students in interdisciplinary scholarship and skill-building.

The economy being what it is, Liberal Arts programs nationwide are struggling these days, but our major and minor are booming. We owe this to our fierce and fabulous teachers and student leaders. Tamsin Whitehead and Dr. Joelle Ruby Ryan have been cornerstones of our curriculum, maintaining devoted followings with an innovative array of courses including Queer Sustainability, Disability Studies, and Trans/Forming Gender. Longstanding instructors like Penelope Morrow and Peter Welch have helped recruit students from their expertly led introductory-level courses; and Dr. Lyn Tjon Soie Len, who arrived last year, is offering exciting new seminars on topics like feminism and the law. Finally, our core faculty—almost every one of whom is also serving in a major leadership position in their home departments—continue to go above and beyond in their teaching and service to our program.

If you're new to campus, stop by Huddleston 203. Whatever else is going on in the world and around Durham, the WS office is an intentionally supportive space. Anchored by the phenomenal Julia Pond, swinger of kettlebells and scheduling, there's always someone around. We will continue this year to challenge hate and intolerance in all their forms. But we will also continue loving each other, laughing and crying together, and eating chocolate.



Announcing the new Feminist Studies Graduate Certificate

Approved in May of 2017

The Graduate Certificate in Feminist Studies is designed to provide students with an opportunity to pursue feminist scholarship within a structured, interdisciplinary curriculum. It can be earned by students enrolled in a Graduate Degree Program, or as a stand-alone certificate for those who have completed their Bachelor's Degree from an accredited institution.

The Graduate Certificate in Feminist Studies enables students to develop specific skills for use in their own personal and professional development by providing tools such as feminist theoretical frameworks and an understanding of contemporary feminist activism. The Feminist Studies Graduate Certificate also enables students to conduct research in the areas of critical Women's, Gender, and Sexuality Studies and centrally relies on analyses from such fields as critical race, ethnicity, nationality, class, age, religion, and disability studies.

The faculty of the Women's Studies program will act as advisors to students pursuing the certificate, helping to plan and facilitate an individualized course of study that fulfills student's academic, professional, and research needs. The certificate provides students a concentrated inquiry in advanced Feminist Studies that is supplemental to their disciplinary training, thereby qualifying them for positions requiring such expertise. In addition, it is an added component to graduate studies that informs and enriches careers, activism, and professional networks.

I have been a practicing social worker for 18 years. I spent many years working for a Community Health Center before transitioning into providing therapeutic services to incarcerated males. My self-care time is usually spent on a trail or a in book!

1. What made you interested in Women's Studies?

I knew that I wanted to make a difference in society but I just wasn't sure how that would translate into a career. So I set out to learn as much as a could about populations I felt were often overlooked, under-served and discounted. I clearly recall my first Women's Studies class and my excitement in the wide variety of topics offered. I was learning so much and I was never bored. Each course fit perfectly with Social Work major and I knew I had found my calling.

2. What is your fondest memory of UNH?

Sitting in class sharing thoughts and feeling free to explore new ideas.

The Barbara A. White Social Justice Leadership Award

The UNH Women's Studies Program offers an award for women's studies majors who have demonstrated feminist and social justice leadership. The award honors Women's Studies Program co-founder Barbara A. White, who passed away in 2014. The award is made possible by generous donations made on behalf of Dr. White.

The Barbara Anne White Scholarship Fund

The purpose of the Fund is to provide need-based scholarship support to students concentrating their studies in Women's Studies. Recipients must be juniors or seniors who are majoring in or minoring in Women's Studies. The scholarship honors Women's Studies Program co-founder Barbara A. White, who passed away in 2014. Preference will be given to students who embody Barbara's legacy and lifelong commitment to higher education.

The Ursula Robinson Daley '93 Women's Studies Scholarship Fund
