# **Gather Round: English Department Re-Dedicates Charles Simic Seminar Room**

The English Department rededicated the graduate seminar room in Hamilton Smith 250C as the Charles Simic Seminar Room, installing a new seminar table.

Designed and created by Owain Harris, a New Hampshire furniture maker who teaches woodworking in the UNH Art & Art History Department, the table is made of whorled cherry, and its supports and detailing are meant to recall the arches of the bridge and the stonework on Thompson Hall, both of which can be seen from the windows.

The table facilitates discussion as graduate seminars gather around the table in the seminar room named after Charles Simic, professor emeritus and Pulitzer-Prize-winning poet and U.S. Poet Laureate.

Students are welcome to peruse the alumni library as well as the informal resource library in the Graduate Office in Hamilton Smith 230. There is also a bookcase in the Graduate Office full of free books yours for the taking!



# **Digital Tools To Try:**

# **English Faculty Present at Digital Humanities Showcase**

Looking for the perfect digital platform to help you visualize and present your ideas? Current and upcoming classes in English have tools you can use!

Professors Melinda White and Krista Jackman shared innovative classroom uses for digital tools on March 3 at the UNH Library-sponsored Digital Humanities Showcase.

Professor White demonstrated students' use of Twine (twinery.org) in English 693: Digital Literature and English 501: Introduction to Creative Nonfiction: Writing for Digital Media. Twine can be used to create analyses or branching narratives (similar to Choose-Your-Own-Adventure books) with sophisticated audiovisual and textual elements.

Professor Jackman shared samples of Padlet (padlet.com) as a platform allowing writers to arrange research sources to show how they are inter-connected, as part of an annotated bibliography or pre-drafting phase in English 401: First-Year Writing.

Professor Kathrine Aydelott, UNH Arts and Humanities Librarian, shared generative AI as a tool for textual analysis or simulations.

Other presenters introduced tools such as Clio for producing entries about historical or cultural sites or objects; ArcGIS Online for digital mapping; and ThingLink for providing interactive virtual tours.






